



# 2. Sector Performance Review for the Period FY 2020/21-2022/23

### Non Financial and Financial Performance Review

- Recruited 8,022 prison officers
- Supervised 134,266 non custodial offenders within the community
- Reintegrated and resettled 1,030 long serving ex- offenders within the society
- Issued 59.5 % of all e-passports applied

# Expenditure Analysis FY 2020/21-2022/23

#### 1. Recurrent Expenditure Trends

• During FY 2020/21, FY 2021/22 and FY 2022/23 the sector actual recurrent expenditure was **Kshs. 173.39 billion**, **Kshs. 198.22 billion and Kshs. 208.32 billion** against an allocation of Kshs. **176.87 billion**, **Kshs. 204.31 billion** and **Kshs. 212.45 billion** respectively. This translates to **98.03%**, **97.02%** and **98.06%** absorption level for the period under review.

#### 2. Development Expenditure Trends

• Under development budget the sector expenditure amounted to **Kshs. 3.68 billion**, **Kshs. 8.27 billion**, and **Kshs. 4.35 billion** against an allocation of **Kshs. 4.53 billion**, **Kshs. 9.34 billion**, **Kshs. 4.67 billion** translating to **81.30%**, **88.52%** and **93.11%** absorption level for the FY2020/21, FY,2021/22 and FY 2022/23 respectively.

#### 1. Recurrent Budget

In FY 2024/25, FY 2025/26 and FY 2026/27 the Sector requires a total of **Kshs.** 331.35 billion, **Kshs.** 327.39 billion and **Kshs.** 340.91 billion against an allocation of **Kshs.** 210.58 billion, **Kshs.** 224.42 billion and **Kshs.** 253.92 billion respectively.

#### 2. Development Budget

In FY 2024/25, FY 2025/26 and FY 2026/27 the Sector requires a total of **Kshs.** 48.88 billion, **Kshs.** 47.92 billion and **Kshs.** 47.52 billion against an allocation of **Kshs.** 16.67 billion, **Kshs.** 21.50 billion and **Kshs.** 22.97 billion respectively.

# 4. Cross-Sector Linkages, Emerging Issues, Challenges, Recommendations and Conclusion

#### **Cross-Sector Linkages**

- The GJLOS creates a secure operating environment to Agriculture Rural and Urban Development (ARUD) While ARUD provide requisite information for its operation and programmes in particular achievement of food security under the National Priorities.
- ➤ GJLOS provide conducive legal and political environment to Energy Infrastructure and ICT (EII) while EII helps in development of bills of quantities and supervision of projects as well as technological improvements in ICT solutions and innovations.
- ➤ The GJLOS helps in provision of security and attainment of relevant government policies to General Economic and Commercial Affairs (GECA) while GECA creates opportunities for fair trade and consumer protection, enforcement of standards and investment both nationally and regionally.



#### **Cross-Sector Linkages**



- ➤ GJLOS help in formulation and enforcement of laws and standards to Health Sector while the sector supports the GJLO sector in sustaining health standards and guidelines in public and private health institutions for productive life.
- ➤ GJLOS supports in providing security to learning institutions, management of examinations, development and enforcement of necessary educational laws and policies while the Education sector supports the sector in provision of policy guidance in capacity building for human capital for its learning programmes.
- For GJLOS supports the Public Administration and International Relations (PAIR) sector in provision of security, enhancement of accountability, governance and rule of law while PAIR ensures harmony and cohesion in the country, resource allocation; and ensures accountability and transparency.

- There is a significant variance in the resource requirement vs the allocation and the sector has proposed various interventions within the MTEF period.
- The Sector will continue to strengthen and maintain partnerships with other sectors to ensure that the cross-sector linkages are fully exploited.
